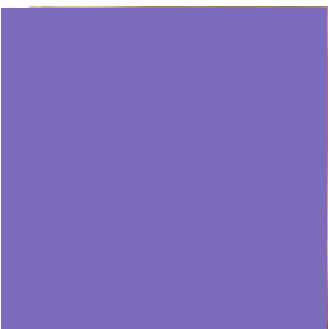
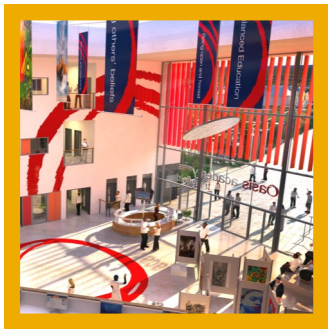
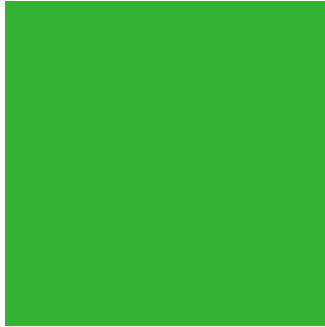

Student Planners

Students are given a Student Planner at the beginning of Autumn Term in which they are able to record information including homework, involvement in activities, subject area targets, notes and achievements. The Planner is an important document which all students in the high school are expected to use and value. It should be brought to school at all times. It is a vital part of recording necessary information.

We would ask that each week you check the Student Planner is being used properly and sign your name in the allocated area. Tutors will also check regularly that the Student Planners are being used properly so that together we can monitor the progress and organisation of your child's work. If, for any reason, your child loses their Student Planner, they will be expected to pay the full cost for a replacement immediately.

Equipment List

Students are expected to bring the following to the Academy everyday: Blue or black pen, pencil, ruler, sharpener, eraser and calculator. Specialist equipment for Science, Design Technology and Art should be brought as required. An adequately sized school bag is required, please ensure that this is designed to protect your child's back during use.

Personal Appearance and Commitment

Individual personal appearance and commitment reflects on the entire population of the Academy. It is therefore important that all members of the Academy should take care over their appearance, and take a pride in their Academy by behaving in a polite, dignified and considerate manner at all times. To this end:

1. Every student must adhere to the Academy regulation uniform at all times. This includes sport and other practical activities.
2. It is expected that students will behave in an appropriate manner on travelling between home and the Academy, on visits and journeys and other events connected with Academy life.
3. Students will be expected to take personal responsibility for their work (at the Academy and at home), behaviour, punctuality and attendance.



Academy Uniform

It is important that students wear clothing at the Academy which is suitable for their daily routine. We believe that it also shows both students and parents to identify with Mayfield. All regulation items may be purchased through Skoolkit, 31 Leigh Road, Eastleigh, S050 9FF, Tel: 023 8062 9095.

The Principal's decision on uniform is final

Compulsory items:

- Black blazer with Academy badge.
- Mid-grey or black trousers.
- Academy Tie.
- Plain, short or long sleeved white shirt (not revered or tailored).
- Black low heeled shoes (boots, trainers or canvas shoes are not allowed).
- Plain black, grey or white socks (ankle or to the knee).
- Plain black, dark grey or flesh coloured tights.

Optional Items:

- Academy sweatshirt.
- Regulation mid-grey or black skirt (This must be no shorter than 2" above the knee).

PE and Dance:

- Academy polo shirt.
- Academy rugby shirt.
- Academy sport socks.
- Academy sport shorts.

General

- No jewellery with the exception if necessary of small stud earrings or and a watch.
- Hair styles must be neat and tidy. No shaven, extreme styles or obviously coloured hair will be allowed. Any hairbands must be plain blue or black, bows or flowers are not permitted.
- No make-up/nail varnish or false nails may be worn at the Academy.
- Sensible school bag.

Mobile Phones

Mobile phones are not allowed to be used in the Academy at any time. If mobiles are brought into school they may be kept in the school bag, switched off. If a student is caught using a phone it will be confiscated in the first instance and returned at the end of the day. Further instances will result in the mobile phone being confiscated and only returned to a parent.

Valuables

Items of value must not be brought into school (eg jewellery, Walkmans, MP3s, significant amounts of money etc). The Academy cannot accept liability for loss of valuables brought into the Academy and such items, if used, will be confiscated during the school day.

Young people motivated by an attractive, credible rewards and currency scheme help raise standards on key fronts, becoming more active members of the school community and better ambassadors for it.

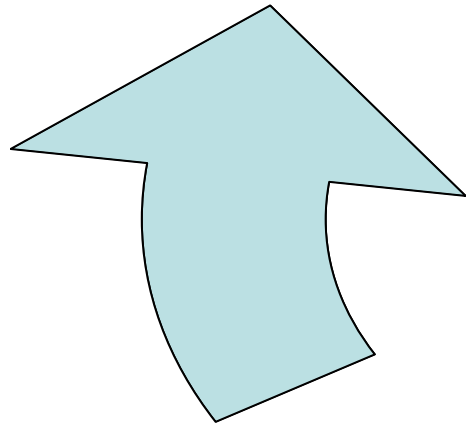

Classroom Behaviour Steps

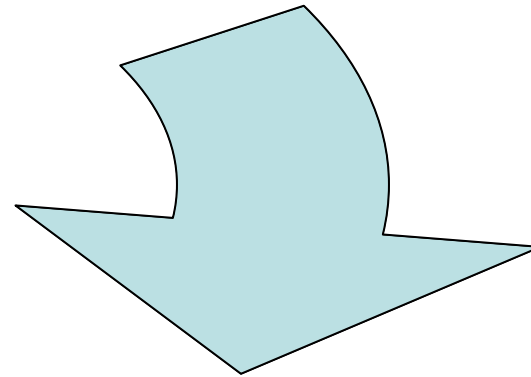
Student who continues to fail to comply with instruction will initiate contact home by YL/ALT.



Student continues to disrupt alternative classroom placement despite warnings then removed to Year Leader

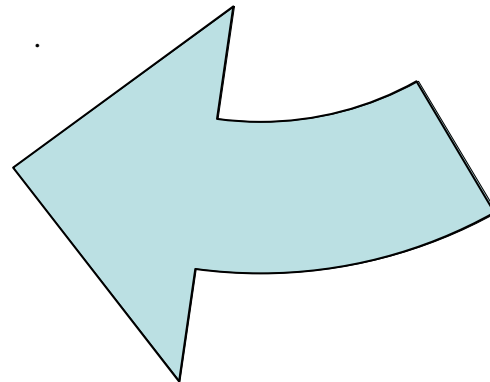
Required Steps to include:

- Expectations explained and readmitted to class
- **Detention set – 20-30 min**

Punctuality & Attendance

Punctuality

Punctuality is an important part of self-discipline and is essential to good time management.

Students are expected to ensure they are in the classroom on time.

If they arrive after 8.35am and before 9.00am students must sign in at the late desk in reception. They will be marked late in the register and will have to attend a 'Late Detention'. If they arrive after 9.00am they must sign in at Student Services and attend a 'Late Detention'.

Attendance

Students must attend the academy every day. If they are not at the Academy they must have a justifiable reason - please telephone Student Services before 9.00am on the first day and each following day(s) of absence. On return to the Academy please ensure your child has a completed explanation absence slip which can be found at the back of this planner.

Holidays During Term Time

In line with Government legislation, no holidays taken during term time will be authorised by the Academy. If parents/carers take students out of school during term time for a holiday they risk being issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice (currently £50), which will increase if not paid within 14 days.

Signing In and Out

Occasionally students will need to leave the Academy during the day for an urgent visit to the doctor, hospital or dentist. They must bring a note from you to show to their Tutor at morning registration and explain to the member of staff who is teaching them at the time that they need to leave.

At the correct time students should excuse themselves from their lesson and go to Student Services where they must sign out. They will be issued with an official slip to authorise their absence.

In case of emergency evacuation, no student should ever leave the Academy without signing out. When they return they should sign back in and go straight to their current lesson. Whenever possible, appointments for your child should be made out of school time.
